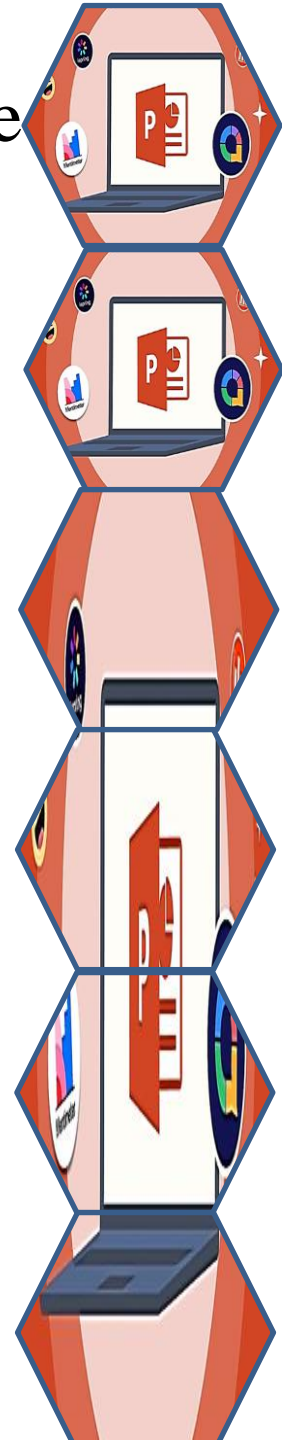


# What is presentation?

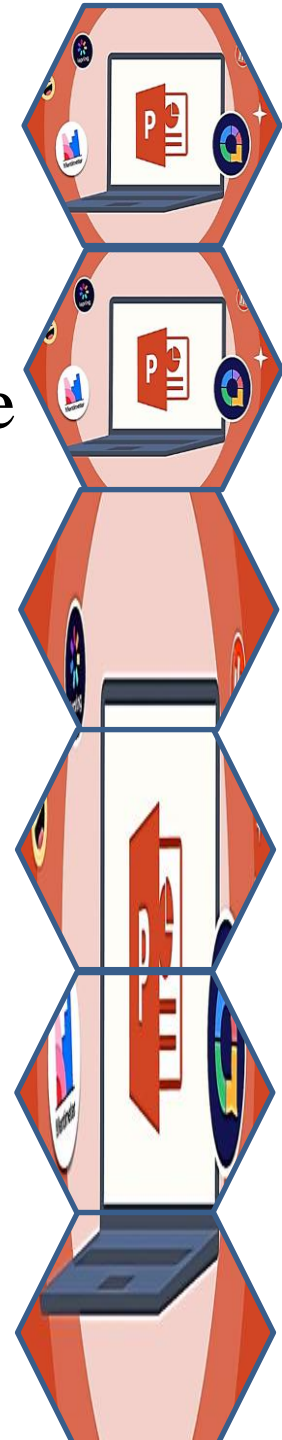
- Speech or talk in which a new product, idea or piece of work is shown and explained to an audience



- Presentations at professional meetings and elsewhere are important to scientific communication and to your individual reputation.
- Your own speaking ability may mean the difference in your getting a job or a promotion.
- Often many applicants for a position will have equally impressive academic knowledge and technical skills; the ones who get the jobs are those who also present themselves well.

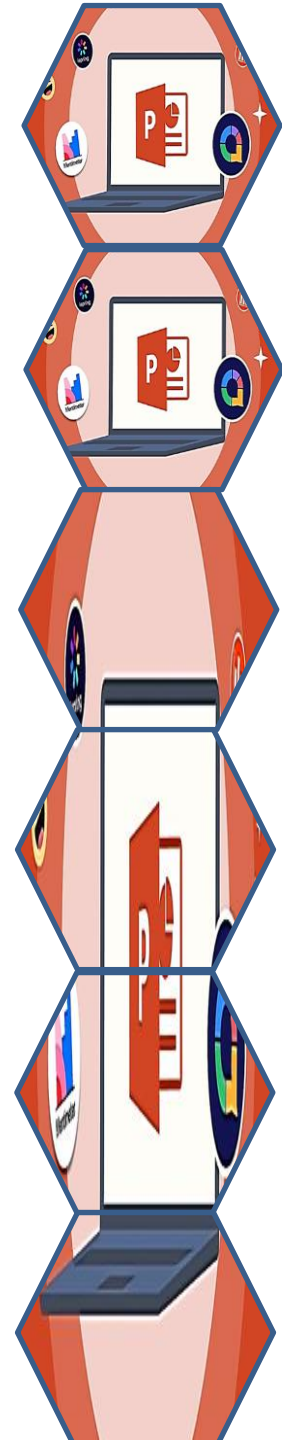


- Take advantage of graduate school as a time to perfect your speaking skills.
- You will probably be required to make one or more presentations while you are in graduate school.
- You may even have a course in your department in which you and other graduate students regularly deliver presentations.
- Attend seminars and special lectures in other departments or meeting to observe good and bad techniques in delivery.



# Kind or types of presentations:

1. Informative presentation
2. Persuasive presentation
3. Entertaining presentation
4. Technical presentation

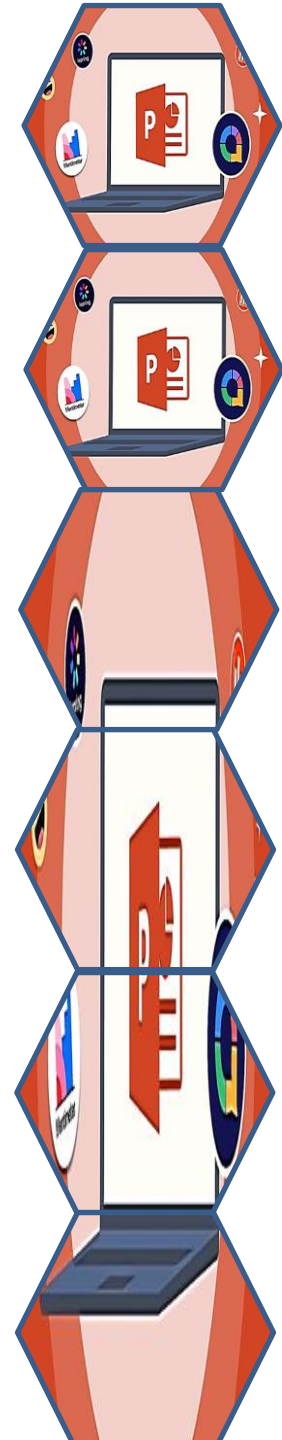


# 1- Informative presentation

- Explain something to people and help them to understand it.

## Examples of informative presentations are:

- A Teacher telling students about something
- A scientist or researcher present their results or finding



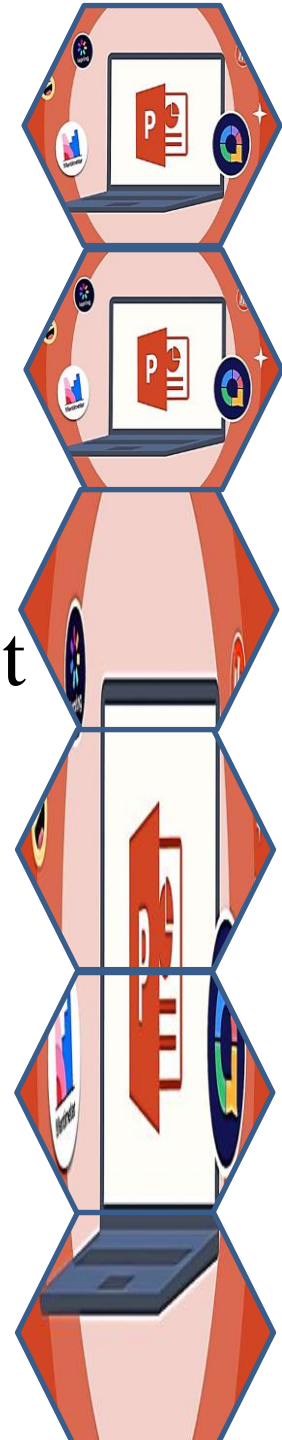


# 2-Persuasive Presentation

- To promote a specific product
  - To sell audience an idea
  - To convince some one to take action
- ❖ In this type we want the audience to think, act and believe

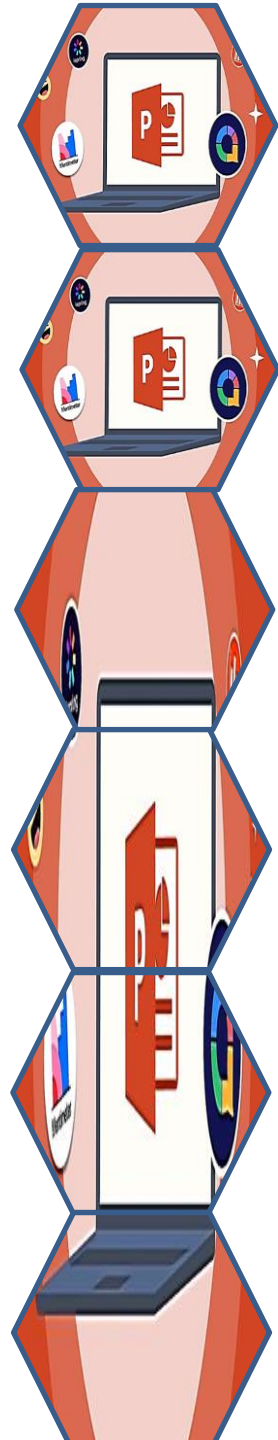
## Examples of persuasive presentations are:

- Improve your health through better eating



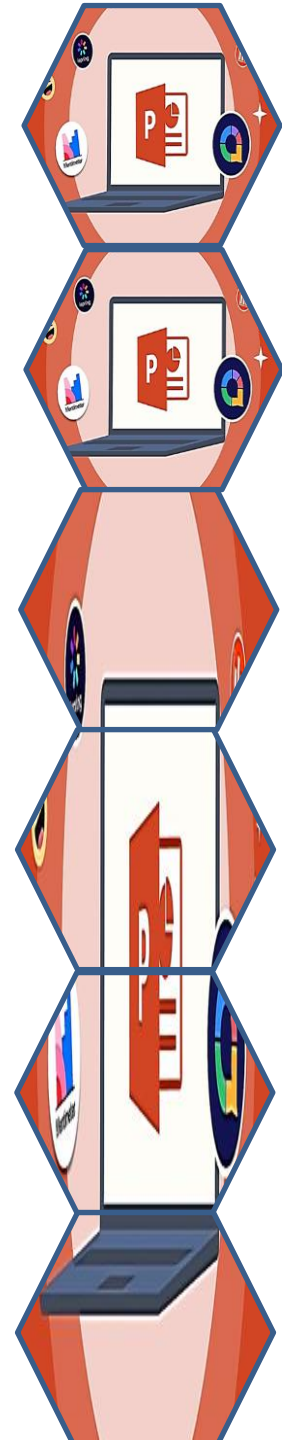
# 3-Entertaining presentation

- Usually short
- Giving the audience an enjoyable experience
- Examples of entertaining presentations are:
  - Telling humors stories or illustrations
  - Comic monologues



# 4- Technical presentation

- Visual and printed handouts
- Even videotape
- ❖ This look like a formative presentation but it goes beyond simple information
- Examples
- Conference talks
- Tech workshops
- Job interviews

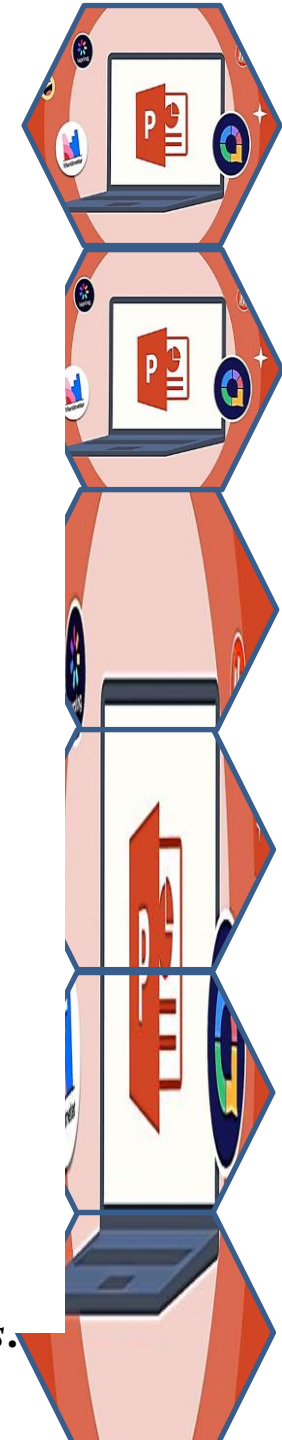

# Comparison of characteristics and requirements for slide and poster presentations

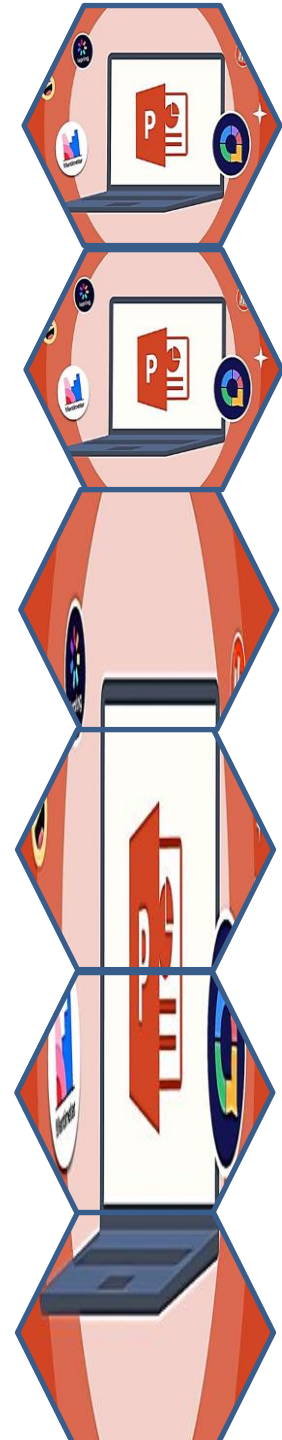
Poster presentations	Slide presentations
<b>The Situation</b>	
Relatively informal; contact one to one or one to few	More formal; contact one to many
Both speaker and audience standing	Speaker standing and audience seated
No moderator; direct contact, no buffer between the speaker and audience	Moderator helps to introduce, buffer the audience, and keep time
Time limit flexible	Time limit formalized
Audience free; only truly interested remain	Audience more captured; most not likely to leave
Chiefly question/answer or conversational discussion	Chiefly declamation from speaker with a short question session
Handouts helpful; easy to exchange names and addresses	Handouts possible; less likely to exchange names and addresses
<b>Preparation</b>	
Materials: poster, tacks or loop/hook tape	Materials: slides or disc and notes
Know your subject—be able to justify objectives, refer to literature, and support your methods and results	Know your subject—be able to justify objectives, refer to literature, support methods and results
Prepare answers to likely questions	Prepare formal speech and slides
Get ready early. Construct poster, review and revise	Get ready early. Practice, review, and revise

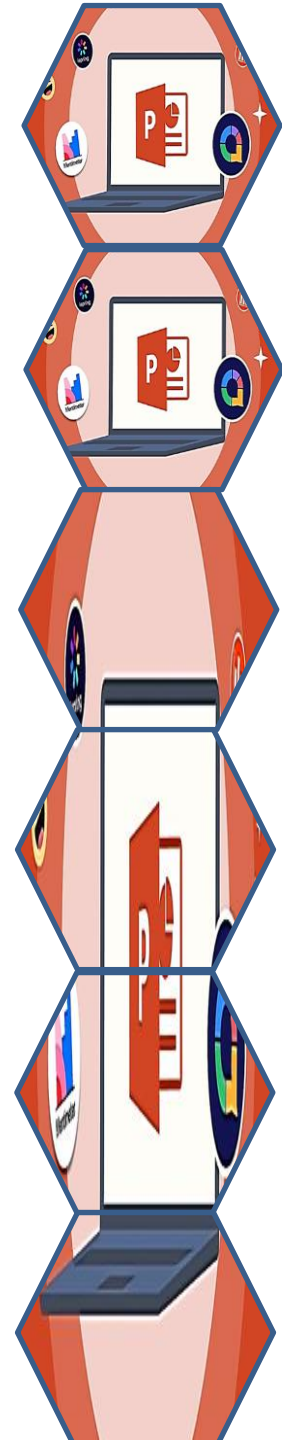
# Structuring the research or scientific presentation

- Research presentation contain beginning, middle and the end.
- Communicate the importance of research
- Clearly state finding and the analysis of those findings
- Prompt others in the academic community to ask questions and give feedback




# Creating the presentation slides

- **Title slide**
  - Each presentation will have a title slide
  - On scientific meeting people will decide weather they want to attend on your title
  - It must include your name, your faculty mentor's name and department, and the name and location of your institution

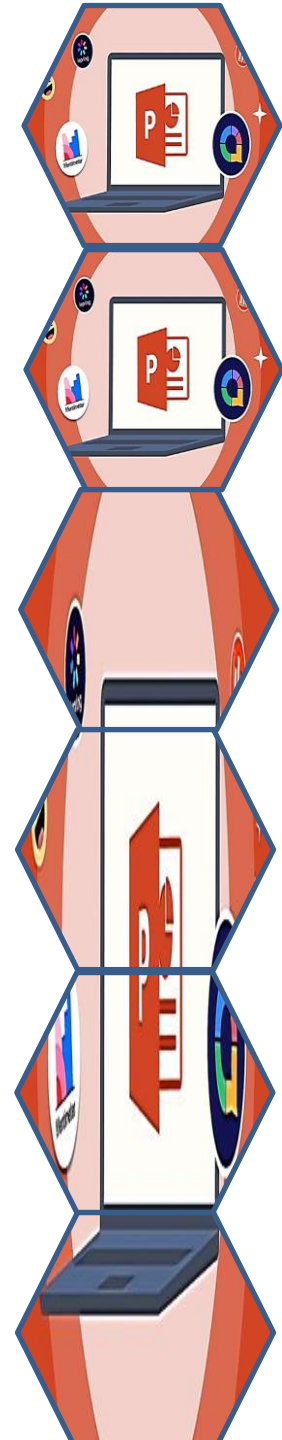

# Preparing the presentation

- Plan to take around 1 minute per slide .
- Do NOT overload the slides with text or too many pictures (write in point form).
- Do NOT use too many animations.
- Be consistent with animation you use.

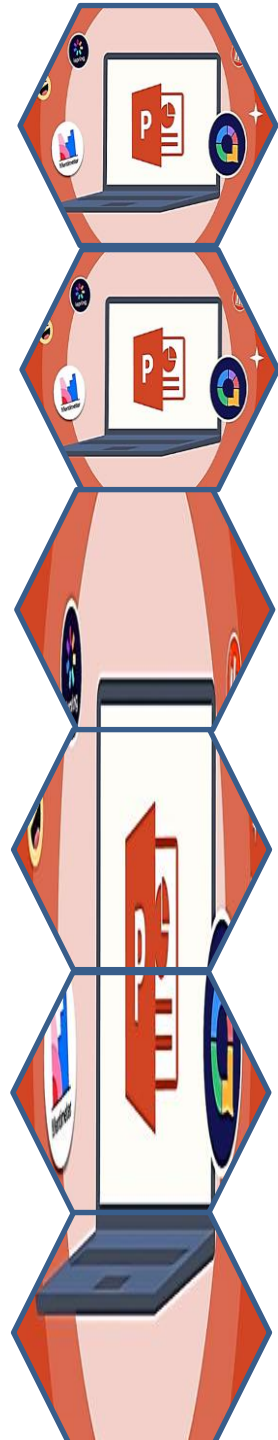
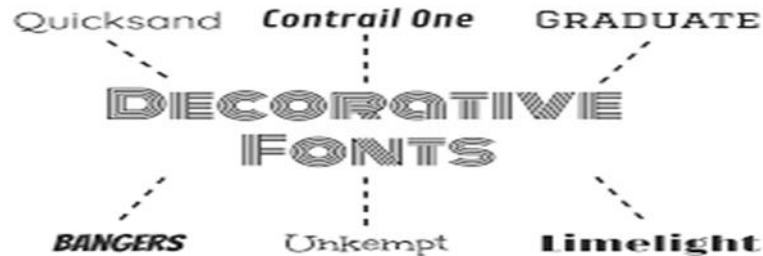


# Preparing the presentation

- **Fonts**

- Use at least 18-point font
- Use different types font for main points and secondary points (36, 24)
- Use stander font like Times New Roman or

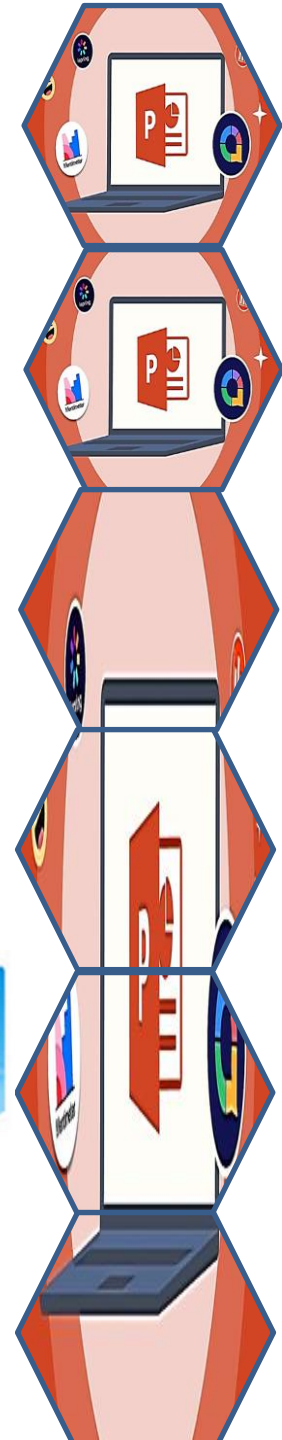
Arial



# Preparing the presentation

- Background

- Use simple background
- Use light background
- Use your background consistently throughout the presentation

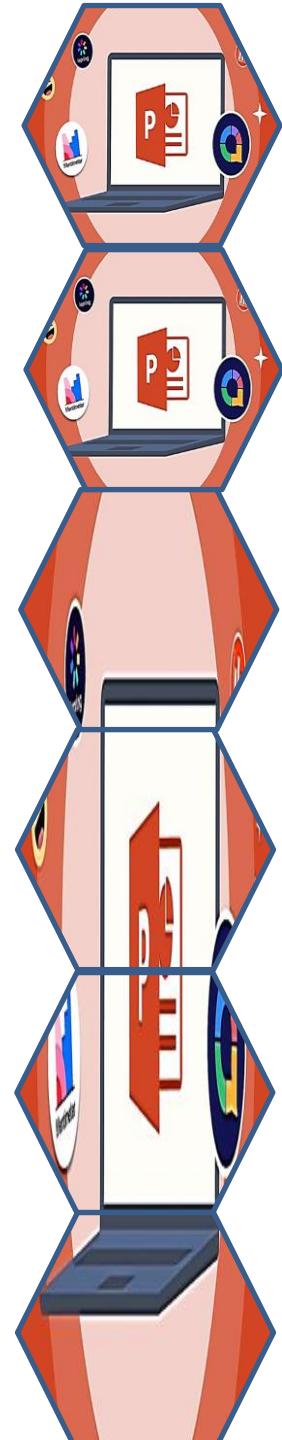


# Preparing the presentation

- **Color**
  - Color of font contrast sharply with background  
(blue or black on white)
  - Color to reinforce logic of structure (light blue title and dark blue text)

 **Planning - Color**

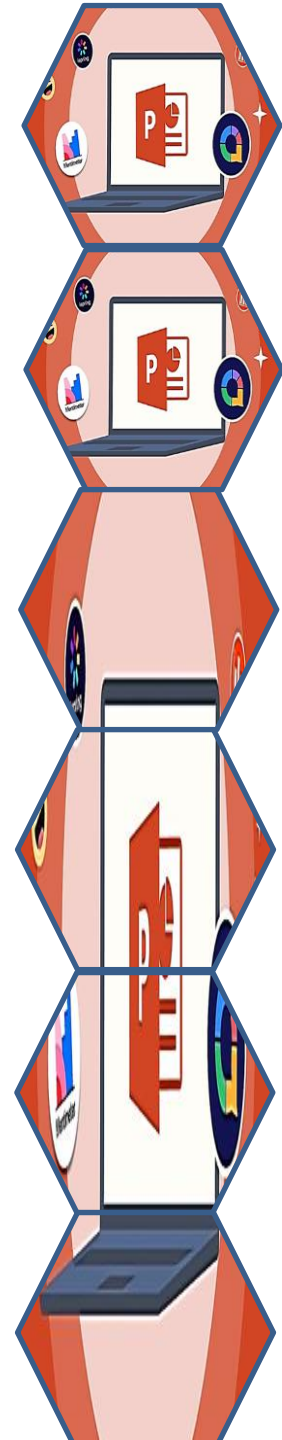
Red - Excitement, Alert	Green - Growth	Yellow - Warmth, Wisdom
Purple - Dignity, Sophistication	White - New, Innocence	Blue - Truth, Trust
Black - Authority, Strength	Orange - Action, Optimism	Brown - Warmth, Friendliness
Grey - Integrity, Maturity		



# Preparing the presentation

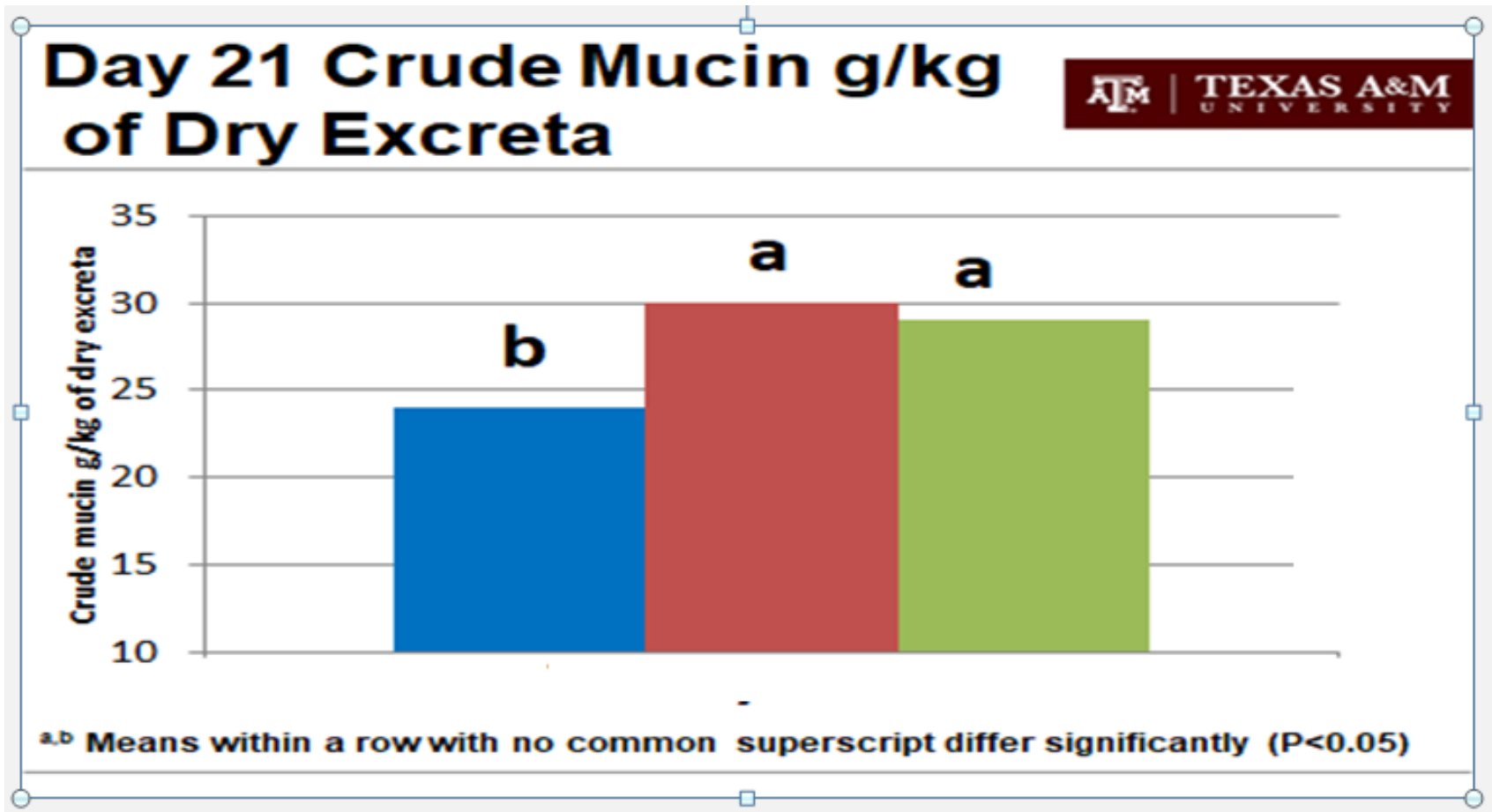
- **Graphs**

- Data in graphs are easier to follow
- Always title your graphs
- Always name your x-axis and Y-axis
- give title to the legends

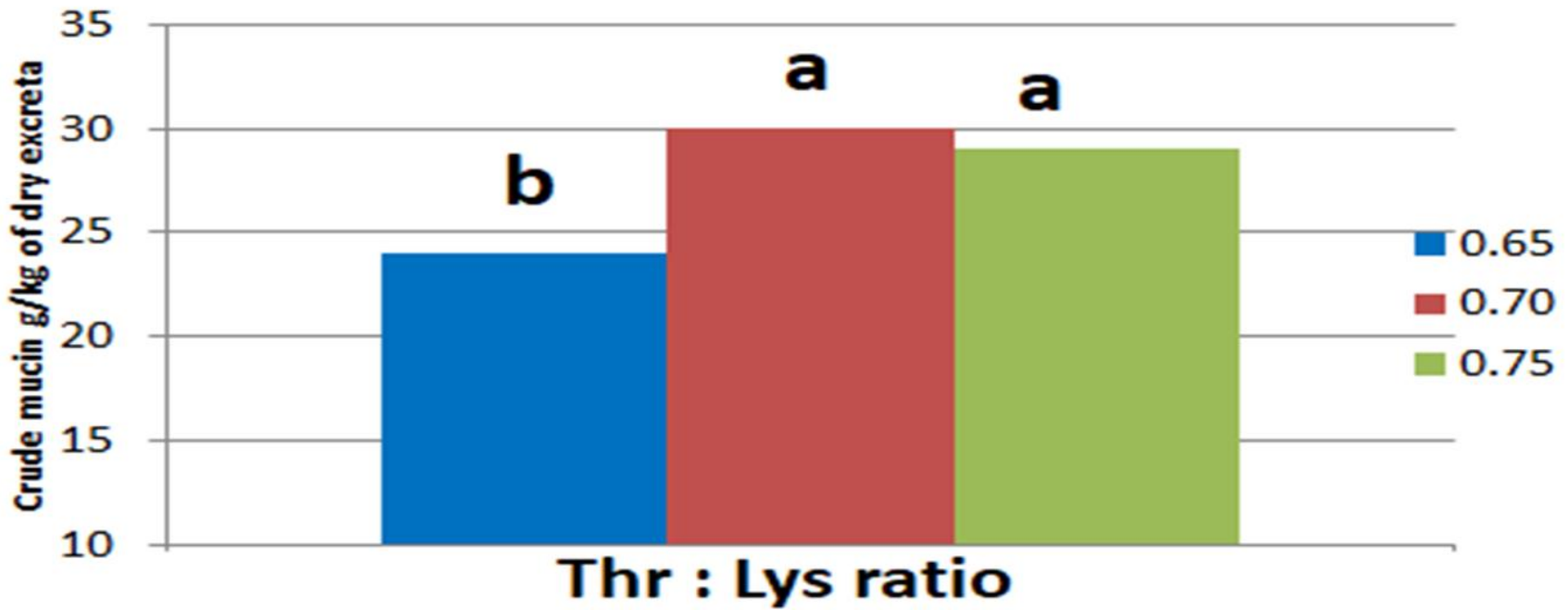

## Introduction

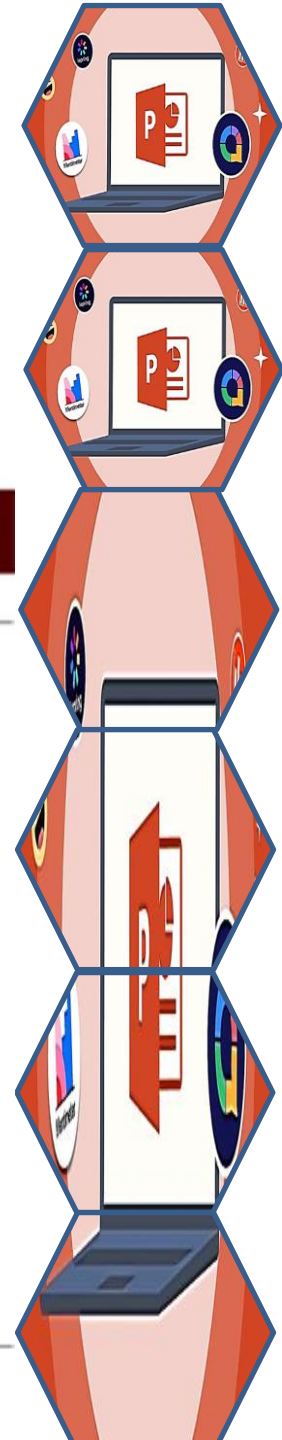


- **Prebiotic**

- A non-digestible food ingredient that stimulates the growth of beneficial bacteria in the gut of animals. (Gibson & Roberfroid, 1995)



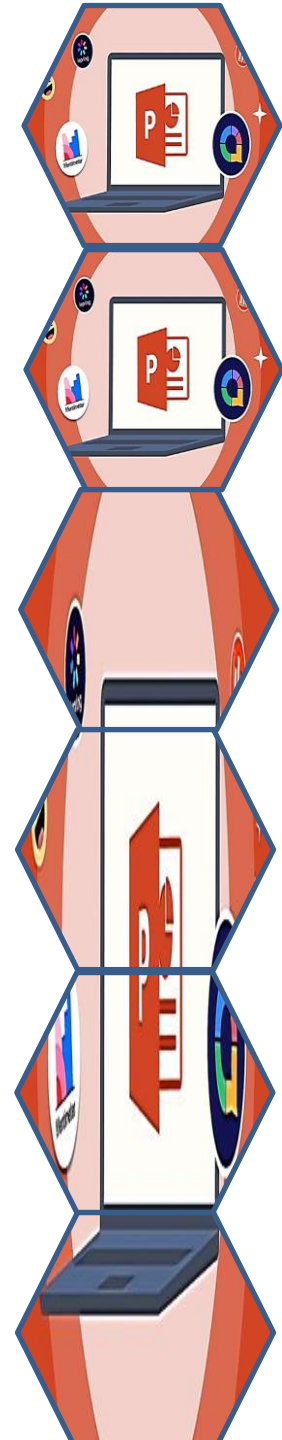

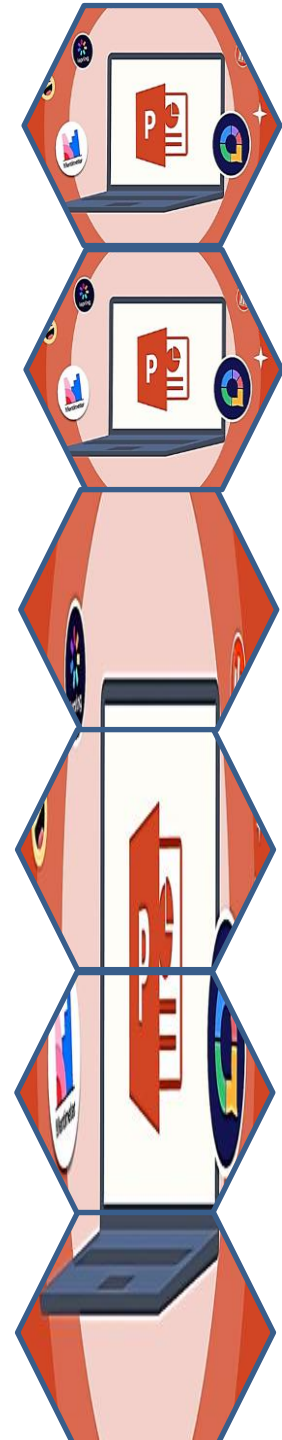
# Preparing the presentation

  - Spell mistakes
  - Grammatical error you may have made
  - Check the slides for repeated words



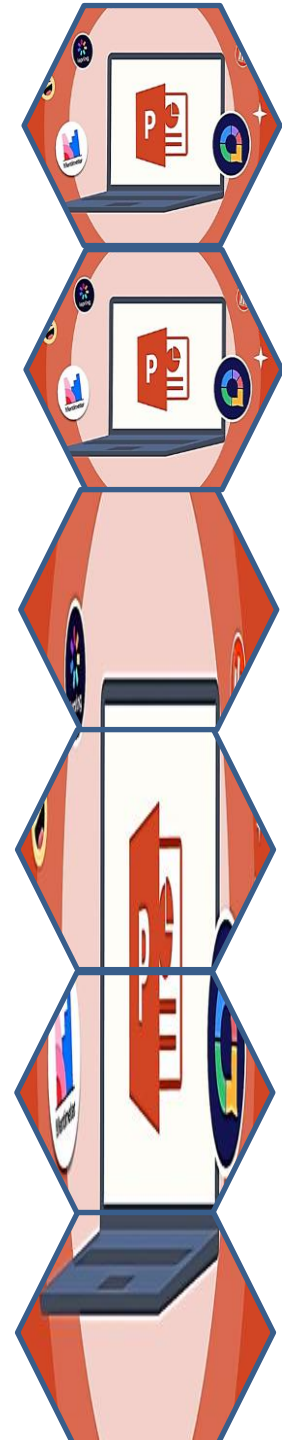
# Practicing the presentation

- Give a test talk in front of your colleagues, if possible: this will show you, whether you brought it to the point or not

































# Delivering the presentation

- Know your audience

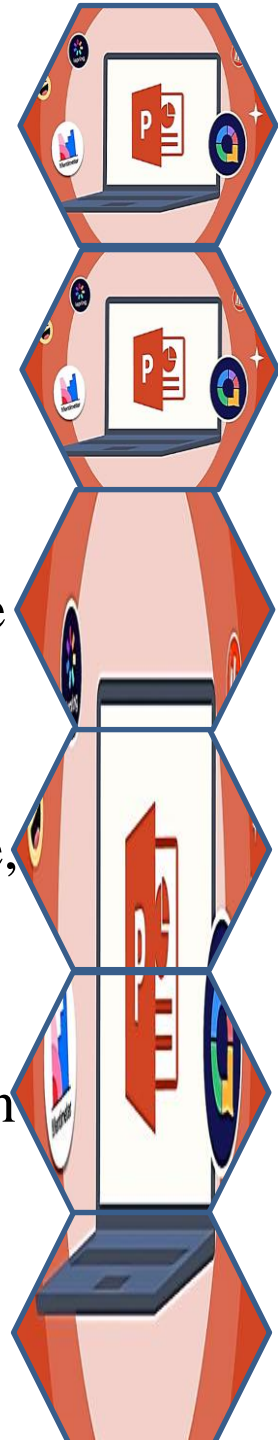

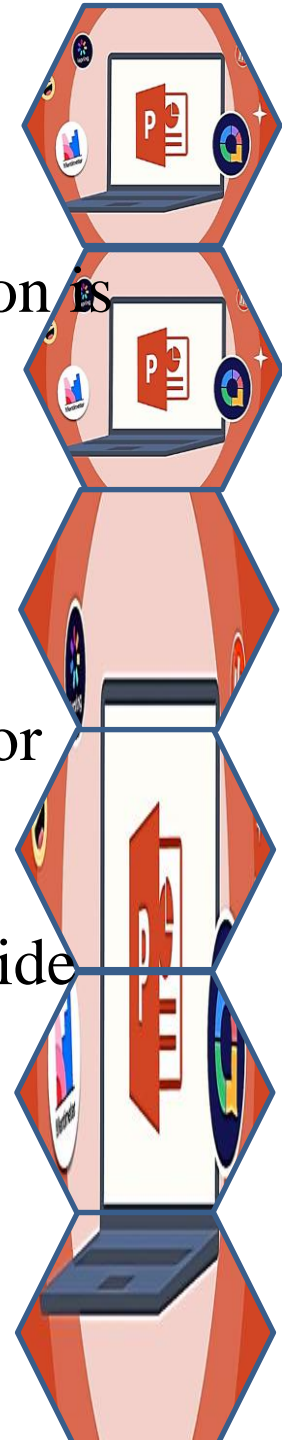

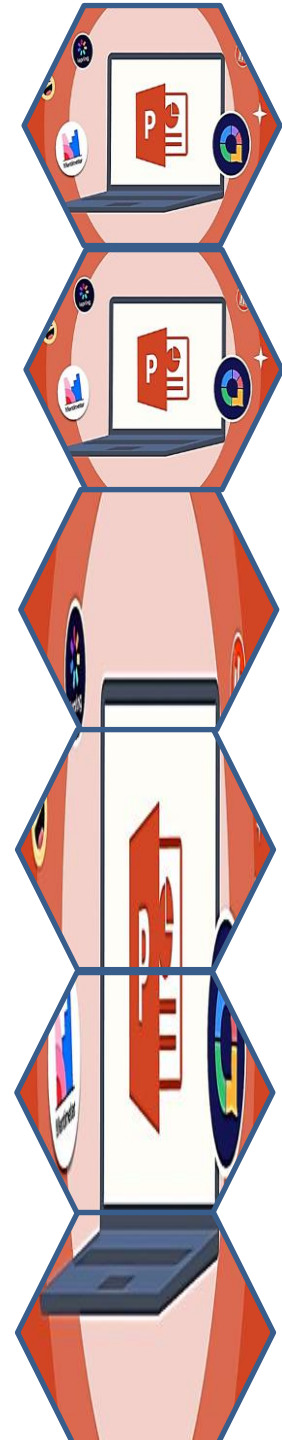
# General notes
